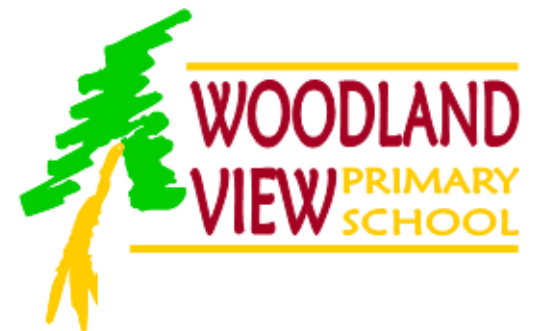

Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school was successful in a range of external sporting competitions this year. This included; 3<sup>rd</sup> place at national level for NFL Flag, 2<sup>nd</sup> place at county level in sportshall athletics, 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> at district level for mixed netball, great success in girls football the girls' football and 50 children representing the school at cross country. The school also had representation at a regional (county level) dance competition from three mixed year group teams.</li> <li>During this school year, each year group (from FS to Y6) was able to participate in exciting morning of sport provided by an external sports provider. This gave children the chance to developing skills relating to curriculum areas that have been covered. This took place during each term.</li> <li>We were able to continue to use the great facilities (running track, MUGA, playground, outdoor gym equipment, etc.) that we have to enhance our PE and playtime offer.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The number of sporting competitions that the school participated in are up over the year. This has allowed for more children to be active and participating in sport. The school should strive to attend more events ranging across more year groups and phases.</li> <li>Last year, the school hoped to engage with cluster Olympic competition again this year. Unfortunately, we were unable to achieve this in 2023/24. The hope is that this competition will return and it will give children the chance to compete at a Level 2 competition. There are currently discussions for this to take place in the coming academic year.</li> <li>School endeavor to raise the profile of Level 1 (intra-school competitions) to encourage children to participate in sporting/physical activity.</li> </ul>

Look into how breaktimes could also be impacted.</p> <p>The running track requires some improvements. Money should be set aside for this next year.</p> <p>This continues to give the school an accurate way of reporting Year 6 swimming data. This will continue next year to help the new Year 6 children who also did not meet the standard in Year 4.</p>

Due to local schools having other commitments, we will endeavor to try and bring this back into the schools offer for sport and external competitions and engagement with sport.</p> <p>Unfortunately, the school was unable to complete this project fully. Around 1/4 of the money was spent to enhance activity. The remaining funds were allocated to different targets: higher than expected transport costs, PE CPD costs, PE conference attendance, delivery and preparation of school sports.</p> <p>New stock has been purchased to ensure that teachers are able to properly resource PE lessons. This has allowed for better outcomes and more active children. Purchase of tennis, tag rugby, basketball, football and netball equipment.</p>	<p>The introduction of a cluster Olympics with other schools in the area.</p> <p>There is still a place for this target in the coming year. The funds will be measured against quotes and cost to help improve and enhance Foundation Stage children being more active.</p> <p>The introduction of new basketball/netball hoops to enhance the offer of net/wall games. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>To continue to attend the yearly PE conference to stay up-to-date with any updates or changes that may happen with the quality teaching of PE.</li> <li>To continue to use the GetSet4PE subscription scheme to support staff (and external providers), giving them the knowledge, skills and vocabulary that they need to support and challenge pupils further.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Enable PE lead and other teaching staff the chance to enhance their CPD.</li> <li>A chance for staff to learn about new approaches and changes to the PE curriculum and gain further guidance.</li> <li>JW to be released to monitor and support the provision of external coaches. Staff meetings have been used to extend teacher’s knowledge of the resources that can be used.</p> <p>The school continued to use GetSet4PE to support this academic year. The cost of a three-year subscription was more than the initial intended costing.</p>	<p>Continue to attend the Northamptonshire Sport PE conference to stay up-to-date with relevant initiatives and information on SSP.</p> <p>As GetSet4PE is becoming more embedded, the school will continue to use the scheme to help develop teacher’s knowledge and skills. The scheme has received good feedback from staff as an effective tool for supporting them to support, stretch and challenge children.</p> <p>A three-year subscription was taken out (rather than a yearly) to embed the scheme into the curriculum.</p>

These were successful in being able to introduce new sports and enhance skills.</p> <p>Due to the start date of the Olympics (outside school time), school decided to celebrate the Euro 2024 Men's Football Competition. Work was completed by children and sport related prizes were awarded.</p>	<p>Around 65% of children engaged with the School Sports Challenge. We would like this number to increase over time through prizes and awards.</p> <p>Funds should continue to be set aside for this to continue. It gives children the chance to explore new sports and develop their skills.</p> <p>Continue to set money aside (when needed) to celebrate mega sporting events.</p>

Many of these led to further competitions (not just district: regional (1<sup>st</sup>) and national level (3<sup>rd</sup>) for NFL and county level for sportshall athletics (2<sup>nd</sup>) and netball (1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>). JW, MH, AW and MJ have helped organise and attended these.</p>	<p>More money to be set aside for this.
